After school club provision	£3,000	To financially support pupils so that they can partake in extensive extra-curricular activities after school	The number of PP pupils attending after school provision is high The provision of after school clubs has increased in the academic year. In order to procure and successfully run some of these clubs throughout the year, there has been a subsidy for the provision. In addition to this free clubs alongside paid clubs have also been on offer throughout the academic year to enable wider access. Between year 1 – 3 there was an attendance of 63% of PP children attending a club throughout the academic year.
Uniform support	£1,000	To financially support families with the purchasing of school uniform and sportswear throughout the year	Pupils will be wearing the right uniform at all times and feel included and equal This has been made at the Headteacher's discretion where uniform has been provided or discounted. The uniform items that have been subsidized or paid for have only included logo items such as blazers, jumpers, ties.
Support for educational visits and residential visits	£4,000	To financially support families with all educational visits and residential trips planned for the year	Pupils have a choice to attend residential visits and can attend educational visits on a regular basis which will further support their learning. Trips and visits have been subsidised or paid for where required. This has also included guest speakers, workshops such as Stone Age, Animal Man etc. The school has hosted a pantomime for reception children. Children have also experienced the theatre. The first residential has been successful at the end of KS1.
Purchase additional reading books	£8,000	To purchase additional reading materials for pupils to access	Pupils will have a range of books to read at home and at school which will support the reading outcomes. There has been a huge investment into reading books across the school. Each class has a reading corner with a range of books appropriate for both age and stage. The profile of reading throughout the school has been raised.
