

The Passport will help our children further understand our virtues and self-assess how well they are doing.


The Nishkam virtues are based on teachings from many faiths, sacred texts and cultures to promote spiritual growth.


The virtues that we teach will help in a practical way as we travel and develop throughout our lives, they will be our guide during uncertain times, our support when making difficult decisions, and encouragement to be selfless, compassionate and ultimately see humankind and creation as one.

We ask parents to support the School virtues programme, modelling virtues at home and helping children to complete the Passport at home.

The Nishkam Passport contains 50 virtues, each virtue is explained with a definition and children are guided about how to live each virtue with 'Signs of Success'.

There is an opportunity for children to record their 'Success Virtue' and a 'Growth Value' in their student planner. There are also opportunities for reflection which encourage learners to record thoughts and ideas.

She went back to the University of Birmingham to study for her National Award for Special Educational Needs Coordination in 2023. This gave her the knowledge and skills to be an effective SENCO. Since then, provision has grown to ensure that all pupils can achieve, despite the barriers they may face. She believes that part of our inclusivity comes from our virtues led approach, as children can use this to ensure that they are kind and compassionate to all, regardless of difference.



Student Safeguarding & Student Welfare

We have a duty to 'safeguard and promote the welfare of children'. If you have any concerns about the health and safety of a child at this school or feel that something may be troubling them, you should share this information with an appropriate member of the school staff straight away. Some issues (e.g. a child's appearance, hygiene, general behaviour etc.) can be shared with a member of the Pastoral staff in school.

Do not worry that you may be reporting a matter which seems small – we would rather you tell us something which does turn out to be a minor issue than miss a worrying situation.

However, if you think the matter is very serious and may be related to a child protection issue, e.g. physical, sexual, emotional abuse or neglect, you must talk to the safeguarding team below as soon as possible. If you are unable to contact them, you can ask staff in the school office to locate them and ask that they speak to you about a confidential urgent matter.

Any allegations or a disclosure involving a member of staff, a child's foster carer or a volunteer in the school must be reported directly to the Co-Principals, unless it involves the Co-Principals in which case it should be reported directly to the chair of the Governing Body Mrs S Kang.

Key Ofsted Findings

Ofsted Section 48 Inspection – 'Outstanding'

Nishkam High School is a Sikh ethos multifaith school and because of its religious character it was inspected in June 2015 under section 48 of the Education Act.

The overall distinctiveness and effectiveness as a Sikh ethos, multi-faith school are outstanding. Section 48 inspectors look at four key areas:

faith education; collective worship; spiritual, moral, social and cultural development; as well as leadership, management and governance. We are delighted that Nishkam High School achieved outstanding in all four areas inspected.

Key findings:

The overall distinctiveness and effectiveness as a Sikh ethos multifaith school are outstanding.

Leaders and governors share and articulate an ambitious vision for the school in which the pursuit of excellence in academic studies is matched by a deep commitment to creating socially responsible citizens who put others first.

The values that the school promotes define every aspect of its work and equip its students with secure foundations for their life.

As a result of the school's commitment to excellence, students make outstanding progress in their academic and personal development.

The Faith Curriculum is well taught and ensures that students acquire deep learning about religion and understand how to apply this to their lives. Collective worship is the heartbeat of the school. It is inclusive and, affirms all who attend. As a result, students develop thoughtful attitudes to faith and the relationships between and among adults and students are exceptional.

The promotion of students' spiritual, moral, social and cultural development is outstanding. As a result, the school is a harmonious learning community where students are moved to take compassionate action in their support of good works, both locally and globally.

The inclusive nature of the school combines with an outward facing attitude that embraces the wider community so that there is mutual benefit from these links.

GCSE Examination Results 2024

Nishkam's faith-inspired, virtues-led approach to education has helped shape the character of our Year 11 students and the virtues of optimism, diligence and determination have provided GCSE results that should make all those associated with the school feel humble, but proud.

It is, of course, the individual work of students that combine to create the school headlines:

- Attainment 8 score = 52.65
- Indicative Progress 8 = +0. 72
- English/maths 9-5 = 65%; our highest percentage of pupils achieving a 'strong' pass (grade 5 or better) in both English and maths
- 25% of all grades awarded for GCSE this year were the very top grades (grades 9, 8 and 7); 76% of all grades awarded in Applied courses were Distinction* / Distinction/Merit - highlighting our focus on 'excellence for all'.

- Percentage of A*/B grades 60%



Progressing beyond Nishkam


Our aim is to produce young people who not only have strong faith inspired qualities, but also gain access to top universities and apprenticeships.

We pride ourselves on the levels of support offered to Sixth Form students as they begin to consider their next steps. In the spring term, Year 12, students are encouraged to sign up for university taster days and UCAS conventions, alongside apprenticeship awareness events.

In the summer term we host an 'Applying to University Information' event for parents and students. In late June the students register with UCAS and are guided through the early stages of the application process; they will need to make decisions about the subjects they study and the types of university/apprenticeship they will apply to over the summer.

The students are fully supported by their form tutor and the Sixth Form team in completing their applications, by early October for applicants to Oxbridge and for Medicine and related courses, and by early December for the other courses. The support continues through the spring term of Year 13 when students have to make decisions about which offers to accept, with guidance about arranging financial support.

Being based in the centre of Birmingham affords us the opportunity work closely with local universities and apprenticeship providers. Including the University of Birmingham, Aston University, and National Grid. In working with these organisations throughout both Year 12 and 13, our students are prepared for what lies ahead. From campus tours to year group presentations, we have found our Sixth Formers benefit greatly from these outreach programmes, with many students making them their firm choice options when applying for university and apprenticeships.



School Food:

Healthy, made daily, with wellbalanced delicious fresh ingredients

Students will have the choice of assorted sandwiches, baguettes and rolls, salad shaker pots and mixed fruit pots. There is also a selection of dessert pots and tray bakes. Students will have the option of selecting one main dish (option 1 or 2) accompanied by vegetables/ salad and a dessert.

The vegetarian diet

It is widely recognised that a well-balanced vegetarian diet can provide all the nutrients your body needs, and there is much scientific evidence to indicate that vegetarians may be healthier than meat-eaters.

A vegetarian diet is healthy because it is typically low in saturated and total fat, high in dietary fibre and complex carbohydrate, and high in the minerals and vitamins present in fresh fruit and vegetables.

A healthy diet for children

Childhood nutrition has a significant influence on health and development throughout life. As children grow, their nutritional needs are proportionally much greater than those of adults, and the consequences of a poor diet will be long lasting.

A good diet protects against everyday illness and ensures the development of strong bones and teeth, firm muscles and healthy tissues.

In 2000, the 'Healthy School Lunches...' publications made the following recommendations concerning a healthy diet for children aged five years and over:

- The diet should be balanced, with plenty of variety and enough energy for growth and development.
- Plenty of fibre-rich starchy foods such as bread, rice, pasta, potatoes and yams should be included in the diet.
- Plenty of fresh vegetables and fruit should be included.
- Children should not eat too many fatty foods, especially foods containing saturated fat.
- The diet should contain moderate amounts of dairy products.
- Children should not have sugary foods and drinks too often.

Sixth Form to wear professional business attire.

Uniform for 6th Form students

- · A Sixth Form lanyard must be worn at all times
- · Smart trousers/skirts below knee length
- Smart shirt/blouse
- Formal shoes; no trainers, flip-flops, or similar. No logos.
- Head covering for all students during Collective Worship.

Please note that the dress code will be changing for Nishkam Sixth Form from August 2025; further detail to follow.

In order to maintain an appropriate dress code whilst allowing our Sixth Form students the privilege of wearing their individual choice of suit, and access to a modern working wardrobe, the school reserves the right to send home any student who fails to meet our standards.

Supporting in wearing the Dastaar

All Keshadari male Sikh pupils, (and optionally for female pupils) are required to wear the dastaar for Year 7 and above. Please start practising with your child as early as possible and at least by the beginning of the summer break. Please let us know if you require specific support to help your child learn to tie the dastaar when school starts.

Articles of Faith

As a school, we encourage pupils to wear their 'articles of faith' (as specified by an appropriate religious authority). The school ethos is designed to:

- Encourage and value the religious practices of pupils and staff whilst ensuring the health and safety, and wellbeing of all pupils and staff.
- · Support the practice of religious understanding and harmony within schools serving diverse religious and ethnic communities.
- Meet the requirements of the law and government guidance on the wearing of the Sikh articles of faith in the workplace and public spaces (such as equalities legislation, health and safety practices and school policies).

If your child is an Amritdhari (initiated) Sikh, please kindly:

- Inform us by completing the 'Article of Faith' form, to help us support his/her journey through the school;
- Read the 'Articles of Faith' policy together with your child, to help understand his/her responsibilities in school;
- Be guided that, a Kirpan should be worn under the shirt or blouse.

During contact sport in secondary schools (football, rugby, basketball, netball, hockey) and all sports in primary schools and swimming, the school, will provide a specifically designed small Kirpan secured and cushioned within a sports belt to wear as an alternative. The pupil's personal Kirpan should kindly be removed by the pupil and placed in a specifically designed Kirpan box provided by the school and left with staff in a predesignated space. It will be important that the sanctity of the Kirpan is maintained in doing so.

During P.E times and during any other physical activity, the Kara (steel bracelet) should be covered with a sweatband.

Jewellery

In the interests of safety, pupils should not wear jewellery as these items can easily become entangled and therefore present a health and safety risk. To reflect any professional working environment, students may wear simple stud earrings, one in each ear.

The uniform is compulsory to wear at all times on the journey to and from the school and during the school day. Failure to adhere to the policy is serious and will be addressed through the school's behaviour protocols.

STEP 1

The application deadline for entry in September 2025 is scheduled for January 31st 2025, with interviews then being held in late February/ March.

STEP 3

An induction day to the Sixth Form will be held for students with offers in late June/early July 2025.

STEP 4

Places are confirmed officially on receipt of GCSE results in mid-August.

Progressing from Year 12 into Year 13

Pupils' welfare is of paramount importance to us and we believe that regular attendance throughout the year is essential for their academic success and emotional development.

Sixth Form students should strive to achieve consistently good attendance, as poor attendance will affect academic attainment. Students should therefore aim for at least 96% attendance. An exemplary record of attendance says a huge amount about you as a person: that you are dedicated, well - motivated, organised and someone who takes their responsibilities seriously. Good attendance also plays an important part when applying to higher education establishments or future employment.

Attendance affects both learning and student grades. Attendance below 90% equates to the loss of half a day per week and research suggests, nationally a drop of half a grade when sitting examinations. Below 80%; a full day per week and research suggests, a drop of one whole grade in the long run. References requested for UCAS, training courses and employers will include student's attendance record. If a student is in receipt of a bursary, then this may also be impacted.

In the case of a student's attendance being below 96%, this can form the grounds on which the school takes the decision to not allow a student to progress from Year 12 into Year 13.

Are children of other faiths or beliefs welcome in Nishkam High School?

Yes. The Sikh Dharam (faith) is emphatic in respecting all faiths and does not seek to convert.

Is Nishkam High School a selective school?

Nishkam High School is an inclusive, non-fee-paying school with no entry examination.

What faith education will students receive?

Nishkam High School has a multi-faith approach, where people of all faiths and no faith, are respected and supported. It goes beyond the delivery of a Religious Education curriculum to nurture spirituality and personal faith of each pupil, where possible. It builds interfaith understanding and engagement between faith and secular world views. Worship for the whole school, and within specific religious groups, will be a unique and innovative feature of the school place offered.

Where is Nishkam High School located?

The school is located on Great King Street North, Birmingham, B19 2LF which is within half a mile of the Jewellery Quarter Train/Tram station.

Is financial support available?

Students who may be eligible can apply for the 16-19 bursary of up to £1200 to help cover the cost of books, equipment, travel, food, trips and other things related to being in Sixth Form. More detail is available on Induction Day in July, and at https://www.gov.uk/1619-bursary-fund









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
