Introduction

The Nishkam Primary School Birmingham (NPSB) is an exceptional state funded free school. It is a non-selective inclusive school for both boys and girls aged 4 - 11 years. NPSB is a Sikh ethos multi-faith school open to all. The school is a member of the multi-academy trust of schools known as the Nishkam Schools Multi-Academy Trust (NSMAT).

NSMAT School Vision

To empower children with values to enable them to excel academically and spiritually, enabling them to serve humanity selflessly (*Nishkam*) with an abundance of love, compassion and forgiveness.

Sikh ethos

Encourages pupils to practice their own faith whilst learning about major world religions and supporting others to practice their respective faiths.

Multi-faith approach

Encourages and supports pupils of all faiths and none in a context of shared values.

At NPSB we believe that all pupils can succeed when given outstanding teaching, pastoral care and family support. We offer academic excellence with faith inspired values. The overall Nishkam approach to education can be summarised as: "More than Academic Excellence, More than a School, More than Self'.

Faith Inspired - learning from the wisdom of religions

Overview of Admissions Process

How to apply for Reception Year in September 2026

The NPSB admissions process is administered through the Birmingham "Local Authority Co-ordinated Admissions Scheme".

- All applicants must apply to the Local Authority (LA) in which the child lives by completing the Common Application Form (CAF), also known as the Local Authority Preference Form (LAPF).
- Applicants applying for any faith place must <u>also</u> complete the Supplementary Information Form (SIF) and return it to the school.

The appropriate form/s must be received on time by the local authority and school respectively. Late applications will not be considered until all other applications have been reviewed.

Full details and key dates are provided by each local authority. Many LAs only accept online applications. It's important to understand your LAs admissions guidance, which is available on their website (for example: www.birmingham.gov.uk/schooladmissions) and in council offices.

How to make an In-Year application

Applications made outside the normal admissions round (called 'In-Year application') are made directly to the school(s) concerned. The local authority will provide an 'In-Year' application form for parents to complete on request but applications must be returned to the school, not to the local authority.

Applicants applying for any faith place must <u>also</u> complete the Supplementary Information Form (SIF) and return it to the school.

If a place is available and there is no waiting list then the school will admit the new applicant. If more applications are received than there are places available then all applications on the waiting list will be ranked in accordance with the over-subscription criteria.

Children with an Educational Health Care Plan (EHCP)

Under section 43 of the Children's and Families Act 2014, schools that are named in section I of a final EHCP must admit the child into their setting.

This gives such children overall priority for admission to the named school. This is not an over-subscription criterion.

Over subscription

Where the number of applications received is equal to or fewer than the published admissions number all applicants will be offered a place without being ranked.

Where the number of applications received is more than there are places available, priority for admission will be given to those children who meet the oversubscription criteria set out below.

When applying through the Faith category, if the Supplementary Information Form is incomplete, your application will automatically be placed under the Open category.

Over subscription Criteria

Where the number of applicants is greater than the published admission number, up to 50% of places will be offered to each of the following categories.

Category I - Faith based places

Faith based applicants will be ranked in the following order.

Priority Faith-based places

- LAC Looked After Children, PLAC Previously Looked-After Children or IAPLAC Internationally adopted previously looked after children¹.
 - applying for a faith place.
- ii. Siblings² applying for a faith place.
- iii. Children of staff³ applying for a faith place.

Remaining Faith-based places will be allocated in the following order.

- iv. Child (and/or parent/s or guardian/s) is/are Amritdhari4 (formally initiated) Sikhs.
- v. Keshdhari Sikh child (has uncut hair).
- vi. Child (and/or parent/guardian) is/are baptised (or formally initiated) in their respective religion.

All applicants applying under the Faith category will need to provide confirmation of religious initiation or practice by completing the Supplementary Information Form (SIF) and ensuring sections B or C are countersigned by an appropriate religious official or authorised signatory from an appropriate place of worship. The SIF can be obtained from the school or the school website.

If there is one place available and two or more children next in order of priority or next on the waiting list meet the appropriate criterion equally, the place will be allocated using the distance criterion. Distance is measured using a computerised system by the local authority. These are calculated as a straight-line measurement, between the pupil's home address and a point in the main school building.

Category 2 - Open Places

Open place applicants will be ranked in the following order.

Priority Open places

- vii. LAC Looked After Children, PLAC Previously Looked-After Children or IAPLAC Internationally adopted previously looked after children I.
- viii. Siblings².
- ix. Children of staff3.

All other open place applicants will be ranked by proximity to the School using the distance data supplied by the Local Authority.

Under- subscription and over-subscription within a category

The following process will be followed when the 'faith' and/or 'open' place categories are undersubscribed or oversubscribed.

a. Under-subscription within a category

If the school is undersubscribed within a category additional offers will be made to children from the other category until the admission number of 60 is met or all applicants have been offered a place.

b. Over-subscription within a category or sub-category

Where the number of applications is greater than the admission number, all applications will be ranked using the oversubscription criteria set out above. Thereafter, all other applications will be ranked using proximity to the school based on the distance data provided by Birmingham Local Authority.

Tie-break

If a tie-break is necessary due to applicants living equidistant from the school, the relevant applicants will be ranked using a computerised random number generator programme.

Waiting list

The school will maintain a waiting list in the year of transfer until the end of the first academic term of the year. Places will be allocated in priority order of the oversubscription criteria. Each added child will require the list to be ranked again in line with the oversubscription criteria.

Fair Access Protocol

The school will participate in the LA's Fair Access Protocol. Children included in the Fair Access Protocol will take precedence over those held on the waiting list. Once a child has been identified for admission to the school under the Fair Access Protocol, the school will notify the local authority of the decision to accept or refuse the child's admission.

Appeals

Appeals against a decision not to offer you a school place are administered by the School Admissions and Pupil Placements Service, Birmingham City Council. Full details are available on the following link:

Summary of compulsory school age⁵ and options for starting school.

All parents must apply to enter the Reception Class in September after the child's fourth birthday. Although most children start school at this age the School Admissions Code provides some flexibility for parents who feel their child is not ready to start school in September following their fourth birthday. However, all children must start school when they have reached compulsory school age⁵ after their fifth birthday. The options and procedures for Deferred /part time/summer born delayed admission are summarised below.

After receiving an offer to start school full time from the September after a child's fourth birthday parents may then write to the Headteacher to request to defer or delay the start, or to request to start on a part-time basis. The criteria and procedure for the various options are given below.

Deferring entry to Reception Year - options

Option I: Defer starting Reception Year up until the child reaches compulsory school age⁵ (the first day of term following the child's fifth birthday). After a school place has been offered parents will need to write to the Headteacher to arrange the deferred start date. The school place will then be held until the first day of the spring or summer term as appropriate.

Option 2: Start part time until the child reaches compulsory school age⁵. After a school place has been offered parents will need to write to the Headteacher to request a part time start. The Headteacher will plan how to fit the part time admission into the organisation of the school.

Option 3: Defer entry until after the compulsory school age⁵, so as to start school in September after the fifth birthday. Once a school place has been offered parents will need to write to the Headteacher to request the deferred start date. However, the school place would not be held open for them for a whole year. Parents would need to make a new application for a place in the following September's intake. This would be for a Year One place; late applications will be considered as 'In Year Application' because their child would have missed the Reception Year.

If such parents believe that their child should start in the Reception Year instead, a year later than the child was due to start, this is called a delayed start. The procedure for requesting a delayed start is described in the section below.

Delaying Reception Year admission or educating children outside their chronological age group.

Parents of summer born children (born between I April and 31 August) may not want their child to start school until the September following their fifth birthday. However, these applications will be considered for Year I not Reception. If a parent wants their application to be considered for Reception, they may request that they are admitted outside of their normal age group – to reception rather than year I.

A separate written request must be made at the same time as making the online application for the child's actual age group. Supporting documentation can be uploaded if you wish to do so.

Parents are encouraged to discuss how their child's needs can be met in the Reception class at age 4 with the Headteacher. They should also read the Department for Education's advice for parents.

Children can access their reception year in any setting that is registered with Ofsted and meets the Early Years Foundation Stage Framework statutory requirements. This can be a childminder, pre-school, Day Nursery, or school reception class.

The admission authority for each school will decide based on the circumstances of the case and in the best interests of the child. The request must set out the reasons why the request is being made and must be accompanied with relevant evidence which may include;

- the parents' views
- recent information about the child's academic, social and emotional development
- recent medical history and the views of a medical professional
- whether they have previously been educated out of their normal age group
- whether they may naturally have fallen into a lower age group if it were not for being born prematurely

The views of the head teacher will be an important part of this consideration. We may also gather information from any professionals involved with the child e.g. nursery education provider, educational psychologists, to consider whether any of the following apply;

• whether the child shows significant delay in intellectual development/education skills, across all subject area,

to an extent that curriculum differentiation (with appropriate SEN resources) is not reasonable

- whether the child's physical maturity places them in a position of being developmentally different from their peer group
- whether the child shows an equivalent delay in emotional development and social skills, appropriate for a younger peer group

The application will be processed and a school place will be secured. This place can later be withdrawn if the request for delayed admission is approved. If it is agreed that the child can delay entry, a new application will need to be made for the following September and this will be considered along with all the applicants for admission in that year. It is not possible to reserve a place for the following year. Therefore, there can be no guarantee of a place being available at the school, as this is dependent on the number of applicants that year.

If the request is not agreed, parents must decide whether to accept the place offered in the child's normal age group or refuse it and make an in-year application for the September following the child's 5the birthday.

Parents have a statutory right of appeal against the refusal of a place at a school for which they have applied. This right does not apply if the child is offered a place at the school but it is not in the preferred age group.

Definitions

IA 'looked after child' or a child who was previously looked after but immediately after being looked after became subject to an adoption, child arrangements, or special guardianship order including those who appear [to the admission authority] to have been in state care outside of England and ceased to be in state care as a result of being adopted. A looked after child is a child who is (a) in the care of a local authority, or (b) being provided with accommodation by a local authority in the exercise of their social services functions (see the definition in Section 22(1) of the Children Act 1989).

An adoption order is an order under the Adoption Act 1976 (see Section 12 adoption orders) and children who were adopted under the Adoption and Children Act 2002 (see Section 46 adoption orders). A 'child arrangements order' is an order settling the arrangements to be made as to the person with whom the child is to live under Section 8 of the Children Act 1989 as amended by Section 14 of the Children and Families Act 2014. Section 14A of the Children Act 1989 defines a 'special guardianship order' as an order appointing one or more individuals to be a child's special guardian (or special guardians).

² "Sibling". Where a child has a brother/sister, half brother/sister (where the children share one common parent), step brother/step sister or fostered/adopted sibling living at the same home address (i.e. the genuine principal place of residence where they normally and regularly live) and who will be still attending Nishkam Primary School Birmingham in September 2026.

(Where parents have a shared responsibility for a child and the child lives with both parents for part of the school week, then the home address will be determined as the address where the child lives for the majority of the school week (i.e. three out of the five days). Parents will be required to provide documentary evidence to support the address they wish to be considered for allocation purposes).

³'Staff'. Children of all teaching and non-teaching staff who have been employed at the school for at least two years at the time at which the application for admission to the school is made, or a member of staff is recruited to fill a vacant post for which there is a demonstrable skill shortage.

⁴ Amritdhari (formally initiated) Sikh is defined in these arrangements as those who have undergone the Khanda-ki-Pahul Amrit Sanchar initiation.

⁵ 'Compulsory school age' is reached on the first day of term after a child's fifth birthday (or on the child's fifth birthday if it falls on the first day of term).
