It has been a relentless year of school improvement and change, and I thank you wholeheartedly for embracing the changes and continuing to support the school. I would also like to take this opportunity to thank all of the staff for all of their hard work. All leaders and staff were confident going into the inspection due to the excellent school self-evaluation and school improvement processes in place. It has been a relentless year of hard work, but hard work reaps benefits, and our pupils are always at the forefront of everything that we do.

## Read all about us...

#### Nursery

Firstly, a warm welcome to all our new families who have joined us in Nursery this term. We are so happy that you are part of the Primley family, and the children are settling in beautifully. Everyone in Nursery is making Primley Proud by using their virtues of kindness and helpfulness to be good friends!

It has been an exciting half term! Firstly – the snow! We used this as a learning opportunity to explore lots of maths skills. We used our virtue of creativity to make a sledge, and then the children helped pull each other down a small hill. We discussed the vocabulary of *heavy and light* and why it was a little bit harder to pull the sledge when someone was sitting inside it. The children really impressed us by using their virtue of patience to wait for their turn on the sledge – well done, Nursery! We made and counted snowballs, and some children could remember that a snowball is a sphere shape. WOW! Nursery, you have impressed me with your ability to recall and use wonderful words. We couldn't let the snow melt away without making a snowman. We worked collaboratively to make a new friend. The children were able to talk about how the snow felt on their hands and came up with their own ideas for dressing the snowman.



Our topic this term has been houses and homes. The children have enjoyed looking at pictures of their own houses and talking about them. We were able to talk about shape, colour, door numbers and size from all the pictures that you sent in -Thank you for your support with this! The children also went on to draw and build houses out of a range of materials.



Our new snack table has been a huge success and is a great opportunity to use our virtues of cleanliness, courtesy, and patience. There is lots of lovely table talk happening around the snack table about healthy eating, personal preferences, and reflections on the previous day or the weekend. The children have been enjoying social time as well as learning how to use good table manners and sit and eat safely. Next term, we are going to start promoting independence, and the children will take part in preparing their own snacks as well as writing their name on a snack register.

It has been a very quick but exciting half term, and we are all so proud of the learning that has taken place. Have a lovely rest and see you next term for more playing and exploring!

#### Reception

What a wonderful start to the term we've had in Reception, despite the snowy weather that greeted us on our return! The children were thrilled to explore the snow, and it set the perfect scene for discussions about the changing seasons and winter weather. It's been a fantastic opportunity for hands-on learning, and we've made great use of the frosty conditions in our science lessons. The children investigated how ice changes when it warms up and how water can freeze to become solid again, linking these ideas to their snowy experiences. They also showed great curiosity and teamwork during these experiments, using the virtue of kindness as they helped one another and took turns.



Our topic this term is Shelters, and it's been an exciting journey of exploration. During our time in the forest, the children investigated different animal shelters, learning how various creatures keep themselves safe and warm. Inspired by their findings, they worked in teams to create their own shelters using natural materials. To test their creations, we poured water over the top to see if they were waterproof—this was met with lots of excitement and plenty of laughs when Mrs. Breakwell got very wet!



This term, we've been diving into the classic tale of The Three Little Pigs. The children have loved retelling the story through role play, taking on the parts of the pigs and, of course, the Big Bad Wolf! We've also created story maps to help sequence the events, which sparked lots of creative thinking and storytelling. Building on this, the children have been busy inventing their own versions of the story, coming up with imaginative twists and new characters. It's been wonderful to see them using their creativity and our virtue of patience as they worked together to share ideas and take turns acting out their stories.

In maths, we've been exploring capacity and mass, using practical activities to help bring these concepts to life. The children have also delved deeper into understanding numbers 6, 7, and 8 through games, songs, and problem-solving activities.

Throughout the term, we've been using the language of our virtues to guide and encourage positive behaviour in the classroom. The children have been demonstrating peacefulness during story time, patience when waiting their turn, and kindness towards their friends. They've also taken great pride in showing cleanliness by helping to tidy the classroom at the end of each day. It's inspiring to see these virtues in action as the children grow into caring, thoughtful individuals.

#### Year 1

In Year 1, we had another exciting and busy half-term. We have continued to learn lots of new sounds in phonics and have applied our knowledge to writing words and sentences. We now have lots of alternate sounds to remember, such as the three sounds that 'y' can make in words. Our live lesson went well, and the parents were impressed!

In English lessons, we enjoyed using the video *Taking Flight* to inspire our writing, and we have really improved our stamina to write longer pieces. We are learning to use the virtue of creativity to make our writing more unique. We also used the story of *Man on the Moon: A Day in the Life of Bob* to inspire us to write a diary entry and an informal letter. Our writer's toolkit includes the use of correct punctuation, as well as using verbs and adjectives accurately in our sentences. We have also practised spelling the word 'because', using the mnemonic Big Elephants Can Always Understand Small Elephants.

In maths, we have covered place value and addition and subtraction within 20, learning that these bigger numbers are made up of tens and ones. We have done lots of practical and written work to test our knowledge. We are now showing more independence in selecting our own mathematical strategies, for example, using a number line to solve a problem. Reasoning skills continue to be a top priority, and we have been using our oracy skills to explain how we have worked out an answer.







Our science topic was Seasonal Changes. We explored each season and learnt about the things that we might see, for example, plants growing in spring. We also learnt about the weather and had a go at making our own forecasts and rainfall graphs. In history, we learnt all about toys and how they have changed over time. We brought our own favourite toys in for a show and tell and then looked at old toys from all the way back in the 1920s! In music, we have focused on vocabulary such as tempo, dynamics, and pitch and listened to lots of music with an Under the Sea theme. Our RE lessons have taught us about fairness and being accountable for our actions, through activities such as sharing a biscuit evenly and changing the rules of a game. We agreed that it is not fair to change the rules of Snakes & Ladders! In computing, we have learned how to program a Beebot online by using the directions up, down, left, and right. Our DT lessons were very exciting this half term because we designed and made our own fabric puppets. It was tricky to cut the fabric, but we were very resilient. In PSHE, we continued to learn about our wellbeing and bodies, which involved lots of great class discussions. Finally, in PE, we have been doing gymnastics, learning how to jump, balance, and roll. We even jumped off the tall apparatus!



As you can see, we have learned so much this half-term and we are looking forward to learning even more in Spring 2. We will continue to focus on using the virtues of kindness, peacefulness and patience, both in the classroom and on the playground.

#### Year 2

Year 2 has had an exciting and busy Spring 1! Our history topic this half term has been the history of flight, where we've learned all about trailblazing aviators like Bessie Coleman and Amelia Earhart, as well as the famous Moon landing. We have used our virtue of creativity to reenact the Moon landing, pretending to be Neil Armstrong and learning his famous words, "That's one small step for man, a giant leap for mankind!" In science, we've been exploring everyday materials and their uses, conducting fun experiments to test if different materials can be squashed, bent, twisted, and stretched. It's been great to see the children getting hands-on with their learning! We've also been inspired by our class book, The Day the Crayons Quit, where the crayons have written diary entries explaining what each crayon was complaining about. Our writer's toolkit included apostrophes for possession and the conjunction 'because'. In maths, we have been learning about money and finding change. Then, we moved onto multiplication and division and are learning our 2-, 5- and 10-times tables. Please support your child with learning these at home by chanting them around the house! In music, the children really enjoyed exploring pitch patterns, learning a new song 'Once a Man Fell in a Well' and using the xylophones. In R.E., we have used our virtue of compassion to learn about other religions including Sikhism. Through unity and harmony, we learned all about the Langar, then held our own Langar in class (picture below)! In gymnastics, we have had lots of fun exploring different ways to travel on gymnastics apparatus! We also improved our jumping and landing techniques. Excitingly, Year 2 were the first class to receive the special attendance trophy when we received 100% attendance! We were very excited by this. Well done, Kingfishers, and keep it up.

The children have really worked so hard in Spring 1, and we are looking forward to even more exciting learning in Spring 2! Have a lovely half-term, everyone 🐵



#### Year 3

Year 3 have had a wonderful half term where we have been focusing on our virtues of patience, peacefulness, and cleanliness. We have been working hard as a team to keep our classroom environment spotless and respecting all of our equipment – including lots of new books in our reading area! In reading lessons, we have practised peacefulness to allow our peers to read quietly in their heads. We have also been role-playing what patience looks and feels like and discussing what benefits come from acting patiently.





In English lessons, we enjoyed using the video *Taking Flight* to inspire our own recount writing, and we have built up our stamina to write longer pieces which we edit and improve as we go. To uplevel our work, we have been using our magpie journals to choose our own subject-specific vocabulary and purple pens to polish our punctuation and spelling. As a whole class, we have spent time developing our handwriting to ensure all letters are formed correctly and sit properly on the line. In the last few weeks, we have written a persuasive letter to persuade our parents to let

us have a new pet. We have used persuasive sentence starters, rhetorical questions, and conjunctions to extend our sentences. The story of *Charlotte's* 

Web has been a wonderful stimulus for these letters.

In maths, we have developed our multiplication and division skills, using base ten equipment to support this – partitioning numbers flexibly and exchanging too. As a class, we have worked hard to develop our problem-solving and reasoning skills using sentence starters such as 'I know this is true because...' and 'Let me prove why I think this could be....'. Our precision teaching sessions



have helped to embed our 3, 4, and 8 times tables – please continue to practise these with your children at home. This week, we have been learning about length and measure (mm, cm, and metres) and discussing the most efficient units of measurement for different purposes and learning how to measure and draw lines accurately.

Our history topic this half term is Ancient Egypt, which we have loved learning about and discussing in class. Our history lessons have included making a giant timeline, storyboarding the Egyptian creation story, looking at the characteristics of different Egyptian gods and goddesses, designing our own pyramids, and mummifying tomatoes! In art, the children have enjoyed learning about different Ancient Egyptian signs and symbols and planning a design for our own Egyptian scrolls. We learnt about papyrus and made our own scrolls using recycled brown paper and have decorated these with our favourite Egyptian signs and symbols.

During PE lessons this half term, Falcons have loved learning about dance. We have choreographed our own movements and put together a dance about going to the beach, performing this in front of our peers. For many pupils, this has helped develop their confidence in performing and giving constructive feedback to their friends.

We have had a fantastic half term and worked so hard in many ways. I continue to be proud of my wonderful class and all of their achievements. I hope you enjoy the half term and that the pupils have a well-deserved rest 😊 I can't wait to see what Spring 2 has in store!



## Year 4 Kestrels

This half term in Kestrels, we are thrilled to share the wonderful learning experiences and achievements of our Year 4 students!

In mathematics, the children have been enthusiastically tackling multiplication and division. They have also been exploring length and perimeter, mastering the skills to measure and calculate with confidence.

In English, our budding writers have been diving into the world of adventure stories.



They have been crafting compelling narratives and are currently perfecting their persuasive letters. The students have been excitedly using conjunctions, rhetorical questions, and other persuasive techniques to make their writing truly stand out. Additionally, they have been using up-levelling techniques by incorporating fronted adverbials and expanded noun phrases to enhance their sentences.



Reading has been a delightful adventure with the book *The Boy at the Back of the Class*. The children enjoyed uncovering hidden meanings and gathering information from the text through inference and fact retrieval. Their analytical skills have grown significantly, and they have become more confident readers.



Our science lessons have been filled with excitement as we explore the fascinating topic of sound. The children have loved participating in hands-on experiments to see and hear how sound travels through different mediums.

In history, we have been on a journey through time, investigating the changes in children's lives. The students have discovered how leisure, health, and work have evolved. They have also learned about the significant impact of Lord Shaftesbury in improving the lives of children, making history come alive in our classroom.

In Spanish, the children have been having fun learning to name different types of weather, ask and answer questions about the weather, and even perform weather forecasts in Spanish. This interactive approach has made language learning an enjoyable experience.



In PSHE, we have been building awareness of online safety. The students have learned about the benefits and risks of sharing information online, distinguishing between private and public information, and understanding age restrictions.

Number Day was a big hit for Kestrels as they used their creativity to make awesome costumes. It was a day jam-packed with mathematical games, making number posters, and engaging in maths challenges, which the children thoroughly enjoyed.

We are incredibly proud of the enthusiasm and progress our Year 4 students have shown this term. Thank you for your continued support and encouragement. We look forward to more exciting learning adventures in the coming months!




## Year 4 Merlins

It has been an exciting half term in Merlin's class. The children have been using the virtue of creativity in their learning all about sound in science. They have enjoyed carrying out experiments to find out about pitch, volume, and how to muffle sound. In history, they have discovered how different life was for young children in the past and how they had jobs as chimney sweeps and in factories from a very young age. They decided they are happier at school, learning lessons in a warm and safe environment, and talked with huge compassion about Victorian children. In art, Merlin's class have been learning to paint with tints and shades to make objects appear 3D – we have some real creative talent in our class.


In maths, the children have been perfecting their skills in multiplication, division, and fractions. It's been wonderful to see their confidence grow as they tackle new mathematical challenges.

## Year 6 Red Kites

Year 6 have had an increasingly busy spring term! While writing, the children were challenged to use a wide variety of figurative language and techniques to bring their writing to life, as well as think about authorial choice; carefully choosing their vocabulary to reflect their intentions. Later in the term, we also looked at writing a persuasive letter based on our guided reading book *The Girl of Ink and Stars*. The children were incredibly enthusiastic about this narrative and have shown keen interest. Throughout this text, the children were tasked with writing an emotive piece to

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
convince the people of Joya to

revolt against the evil governor and his tyrannical rule. At the end of the writing cycle, the children practiced reciting their favourite aspects of their writing to the rest of the class.

As SATs loom ever closer, the children continue their fine work within their maths sessions. The main focus within our maths this half term has been on fractions, decimals, and percentages, as well as finding their equivalent counterparts. The children have shown a brilliant attitude towards their learning, and this can be seen within their work. There has still been a heavy focus on their arithmetic skills throughout this term, with the children completing a test each Friday. As a result, the children's skills continue to improve alongside their results.

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Within their curriculum lessons, the children have been studying the British Empire. Their topic has ranged from why countries strived for an empire, some of the chronology and important figures of the empire, how the Trans-Atlantic slave trade was used within the empire, as well as some of the reasons why the empire broke down. This study culminated in a trip to Harewood House, where the children were able to show off all of their knowledge learnt throughout the term.



Within our science lessons, the children have been looking at the concepts of adaptation, evolution, and inheritance. This has included looking at offspring alongside their parents and discussing inheritance, the theory of evolution through natural selection, as well as the features of animals and their adaptations which make them suited to their environment.

Overall, the children have had an incredibly productive half term and are due a well-deserved rest. Have a lovely half-term break!

A huge thank you to everyone who dressed up for the NSPCC Number Day on Friday 7th February. The outfits in school were amazing!









## Safer Internet Day
